A significant body of research shows that infancy and early childhood are critical periods for improving overall social and emotional development.

Infant Mental Health

Infant mental health, or the well being of baby, can be described as the ability for young children to experience, regulate and express their emotions, form



healthy, secure relationships and explore their world and learn.

Key findings about early childhood mental health

- Early treatment services can prevent later problems such as violence, school problems and other risk factors.
- Shows there are many protective factors which support the infant, family, community and culture.
- Establishes the sensitive period of brain development for expressing and regulating emotions and forming secure relationships is during the earliest years of life.
- Demonstrates the utmost importance of the parent-child relationship in supporting all areas of development.
- Shows the power of relationship based therapeutic interventions.

What can the Early Childhood Mental Health Program provide?

- Social, emotional and mental health assessments to determine how young children are developing and if treatment is appropriate.
- Provide relationship based interventions with the child and parent/caretaker in their home whenever possible using evidence based and promising practice methods.
- Complete periodic screenings in all areas of development.
- Provide additional support for children in other areas such as day care, pre-school, and school.



- Interagency collaboration and coordination with primary care and other service providers to support best practice standards.
- Provide referral and linkage to other areas providers if additional services are needed by the child and family.
