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An Exceptional Career That Began and Ended on the Same Day Farewell Larry Prindaville

On February 12, 2016, **Larry Prindaville**, Chief Administrative Officer, retired after 44 years of service to Sinnissippi Centers, our clients, and our staff.

Larry began his tenure with us on that same date in 1972, working as a Psychologist providing therapy services. He saw back-to-back clients on that first day, and never stopped working until the day he retired. Larry has served in several different roles, with over 1,000 different coworkers, and through the massive changes to community behavioral health over the past 44 years. Larry recalls: "/

interviewed at Sinnissippi in December 1971. I was interviewed by staff, and by the entire Board of Directors.

Following my interview with the Board of Directors, Board Chair **Beth Tarvin** said to me, 'Young man, you have a lot to learn. If we offer a position to you, and you come to Sinnissippi, we'll have to invest a lot of time and effort in training you; and if you accept a position at Sinnissippi, we will expect that you will stay here for a long time. Are you prepared to make the commitment to staying at Sinnissippi for a long time?' I said, 'Yes,' although I'm sure that neither Beth nor I anticipated that 'a long time' would end up being over 44 years."

It is impossible to truly honor the type of commitment that Larry made to our agency. Many staff, former staff, current and former board members *(including Beth Tarvin, pictured above)*, and family and friends from the community paid tribute to Larry and his achievements as they came together on his 44th Anniversary. Larry's dedication was honored through the presentation of a bench dedicated in his name at the Dixon Public Library, another place dear to his heart. Additionally, a bench was placed at Sinnissippi's Dixon office by his family to honor Larry.

Larry is credited with many achievements, including: The expansion of services to five full time offices, creation of programming for residential services, the first intensive outpatient program for substance abuse in the state of Illinois, the use of mid-level providers for psychiatry, the expansion of the system of care for children, and so many others.

Colleagues throughout the state are mourning Larry's departure and the loss

of his "wealth of knowledge". For these and many other achievements Larry was awarded the Ellen T. Quinn Lifetime Achievement Award by the Community Behavioral Healthcare Association in December of 2015. Although his impact will be felt for a very long time, so will his absence.

To truly understand the impact Larry has had over these years, one must understand the rare kind of character he possesses. His dedication is obvious when you look at his longevity. Over those 44 years, Larry also displayed a work ethic that is unparalleled. He

was in his office before many rise from bed, and was in his office nearly every weekend.

Larry is tremendously generous. Not only has he been a significant supporter of the Sinnissippi Foundation and many other community organizations, but he has been generous with his time and attention. Larry never appeared impatient with his colleagues, and always had time to hear whatever they had to say. His caring for those he worked with is only surpassed by his great love of family. His mood and demeanor are so even-keeled it appears that Larry has never had a bad day Larry is the consummate professional, but demonstrated his professionalism with an impressive level of warmth and concern. Larry is a man of great integrity, and a fabulous orator. He is truly a special individual, and we are all better people for knowing him.

We know that Larry will make the most out of retirement, just as he has with every other experience in his life. He will relish time with his family and friends, and maybe even play a little golf. The rest of us will look forward to his next visit, and try to honor the important work he has done for so long by continuing to move forward the mission of Sinnissippi Centers.

A Lot Has Happened in the Last Half a Century of Sinnissippi Centers Celebrating 50 Years of Service

Sinnissippi Centers will celebrate 50 years of providing Community Behavioral Healthcare services with a public event at Sauk Valley Community College, October 13, 2016, from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.

It was on October 31, 1963, that **President John F. Kennedy** signed the Community Mental Health Act into law. The new law forever changed how those facing a mental illness could get treatment in their own communities.

The beginning of Sinnissippi Centers followed soon after and was the result of the early leadership of the Lee County Mental Health Association and the Lee Mental Health Clinic.

The first part-time clinic opened in 1964 and was located at the Lee County Health Department and later, in a home on Galena Avenue in Dixon, Illinois. The following year, the clinic expanded due to overwhelming demand and a lack of other mental health resources.

Building on this foundation and the efforts of hundreds of area citizens, the **Sinnissippi Mental Health Center was incorporated on May 31, 1966.** On July 1, 1966, Sinnissippi began providing services. From the very beginning Sinnissippi served individuals in a four county area: Carroll, Lee, Ogle, and Whiteside counties in northwest Illinois. Sinnissippi continues to proudly serve that same four county area today.

Through the years, Sinnissippi Centers has expanded to five main offices and four residential living apartment sites. We now have over thirty programs and services for individuals of all ages as well as for families.

"Sinnissippi has a long tradition of providing quality behavioral healthcare," says **Patrick Phelan**, Sinnissippi's President/CEO. "We also have a long tradition of collaboration with our local community providers and organizations, and we have a long reputation of being on the cutting edge of behavioral healthcare," adds Phelan. "We are proud that we have weathered the myriad of challenges over the years to become the organization we are today."



Going More Green in 2016

Sinnissippi Centers and the Sinnissippi Foundation are both going more green in 2016. Many cost savings measures have been taken by Sinnissippi Centers in response to the state budget crisis.
