From our boards, management, and staff

It seems almost cliché to talk about the pace of change in community behavioral health. However, I would certainly be remiss if I didn't talk about the incredible amount of change we have experienced in the last year. One of the most significant funding changes, Managed Medicaid, came to rural Illinois. The following month we opened our first Recovery Home. Not that long after the Recovery Home was opened we launched a new electronic health record. Significant changes to the rules governing mental health in We launched a new electronic health record. Significant changes to the rules governing mental health in Illinois and the introduction of a new standardized statewide assessment added to the adventure. Next, we experienced major shifts in the way in which we provide psychiatric services and began another new endeavor, the use of Community Support Teams. We then went live with the Illinois Health Practice Alliance and Precedence Care Coordination Entity contracts, two very promising and impactful new models of care. All the while, we were expanding school-based services and preparing to implement the Integrated Health Home model. Any of these developments would be impactful alone.

In the coming year, we must continue to push forward in order to stay one step ahead of external forces and fiscal realities. This means looking for new opportunities in value-based care and care

coordination. It means investment in new and expanded programs in areas of significant need, such as continuing to battle

addictions through recovery supports. It means that we will continue to seek out partnerships that position our organizations in the community and across the state to pool resources to more effectively address the needs of those we serve.

The last year hasn't been an easy one, and I can guarantee that the coming year will not be without significant challenges. However, Sinnissippi Centers and the Sinnissippi Foundation remain committed to our mission in our communities. Thank you so much to our staff for their agility and commitment, our Boards of Directors for their service, our consumers for choosing us to provide their care, and all of our supporters in the community for continuing to believe in the mission of our organizations.



The Shift to Managed Medicaid

Maybe the biggest event in Sinnissippi Centers' fiscal year, in terms of change and amount of effort involved, has been the change to Managed Medicaid and preparations for the January 2020 implementation of Integrated Health Homes (see story at right). Nationally, managed care has become the primary method of Medicaid service distribution, with over two-thirds of Medicaid recipients enrolled in managed care nationwide. In an attempt to improve care and reduce costs, Illinois recently expanded its own Medicaid managed care program. On April 1, 2018, rural areas in Illinois, including Sinnissippi's four-county service area 1, 2018, rural areas in Illinois, including Sinnissippi's four-county service area, moved to Managed Medicaid. This move meant going from a single Medicaid payer, the state, to sending claims to five separate Managed Care Organizations (MCOs), who each have their own set of rules and standards.

Illinois Health Practice Alliance

Although Managed Medicaid brings with it some challenges, it also provides a new and important opportunity, the ability to develop innovative contracts for overall coordination of care and to drive outcomes through value-based payment. On March 1, 2019, Sinnissippi Centers began work with the Illinois Health Practice Alliance (IHPA), who in turn contracted with Illinicare, one of four Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) in our area. The contract with Illinicare allows for more intensive coordination of care and a payment model that is based not on the quantity of care, but quality healthcare outcomes. The IHPA hopes to contract with additional MCOs in time.

Precedence Care Coordination Entity and Sinnissippi Centers

On July 1, 2019, Sinnissippi Centers began work with Precedence Care Coordination Entity (CCE) providing care coordination services to individuals with serious and chronic medical conditions that require high levels of care. Why would Sinnissippi enter into the primary care field? Care coordination for overall healthcare is not that much different than the case management and care coordination the agency has done for years. Granted, it does require Sinnissippi to increase our knowledge of medical conditions, but the interventions are all behavioral. That's what Sinnissippi is good at. In addition, there are deep connections between physical and behavioral health, and our focus must be on the coordinated provision of healthcare overall. Understanding these trends in the field, Sinnissippi has positioned itself very well with the connection to the IHPA and Precedence CCE, and other future



opportunities. Sinnissippi is in front of this change, and will therefore, have many new opportunities. In the years to come care coordination for many populations will be at the core of Sinnissippi Centers' service array.

Integrated Health Homes

Integrated Health Homes (IHH) will provide the next opportunity for coordinated healthcare in our communities. IHH's are not a physical place or location, but rather a single service

provider or a group of service providers, who ensure that all of an individual's healthcare needs are met. The Integrated Health Home will be responsible for care coordination for members across their



physical, behavioral, and social care needs. The ultimate outcome of health homes, like managed care, is to provide coordinated comprehensive care to individuals to increase quality of care while reducing the cost. The State of Illinois plans to initiate the new model for Integrated Health Homes in January of 2020.

Increase In School Based Services

Sinnissippi Centers dramatically increased its presence in area schools providing behavioral healthcare and student assistance services in area schools. During the 2018-2019 academic year Sinnissippi

staff were located in 27 separate schools throughout our four-county service aréa (Carroll, Lee, Ogle, and Whiteside



Counties). This year will see expansion to four additional schools located in Rock Falls, Milledgeville, and Polo. The total number represents a Sinnissippi Centers' presence in 39% of area public schools. To meet the increased need, Sinnissippi hired two staff employed full time providing school based services, bringing the total to 17 staff located in 31 schools. The strength of school based programming is increased frequency. programming is increased frequency and access and improved coordination of needed services. One school staff commented "This was the best year we have had with regards to student behaviors."

Center of Excellence

Sinnissippi Centers partnered with the Telligen Community Initiative (TCI) to enhance the Rural Health Training Center of Excellence (COE) for behavioral healthcare. One of the initiatives of our

COE program is designed to attract Master's level interns and then provide them with employment opportunities upon graduation. We recently celebrated the

graduation and ĕmployment of two former

interns, Amanda Briese and Chris Gresham. During that same event we welcomed two of our newest interns, Leah Arthur and Nikki Principato. All these young professionals are completing degrees at Western Illinois University.

Evidence Based Treatment Models

Over the past months, Sinnissippi Centers has increased staff training in more evidence-based treatments. Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR), Moral Reconation Therapy (MRT), Dialectic Behavior Therapy (DBT), and Adolescent Community Reinforcement Approach (A-CRA). Sinnissippi has always looked to evidence-based treatments to provide quality care. These approaches are important because they are proven to be effective through research. They are also important to ensure that limited resources are used in the most cost and treatment effective ways possible.

Community Support Team

Sinnissippi Centers' Community Support Team (CST) became a reality in January 2019. This program is designed to "wrap around" individuals experiencing serious mental illnesses, who have difficulty engaging in traditional care as a result of their symptoms. Our team works individually with each participant on ways to support wellness and recovery and provides outreach services. To date, we have 45 participants in both Lee and Whiteside Counties with hopes to expand to Carroll and Ogle Counties in the future. The mission of CST is to engage in supportive teamwork to foster trust, encouragement, hope, and recovery while remaining trauma-informed.

Recovery Home Success

Sinnissippi Centers opened our first Recovery Home on May 30, 2018. Since opening 25 men have been served. The Recovery Home is a licensed treatment facility which provides a structured supportive environment offering substance use prevention and mental health individual and group treatment. It

is supervised 24 hours a day 7 days a week. The Recovery Home serves adult men who are working to rebuild their lives in recovery. Individual length of stay

varies depending on the needs of the person, but an average is 6 to 9 months. They come from the four-county area Sinnissippi Centers serves, Carroll, Lee, Ogle, and Whiteside Counties.

Electronic Health Record

There are so many factors that affect human services organizations today and so many changes in the industry. Sometimes those changes are never seen by the clients we serve or the general public but have profound impacts on the organization. One such change has been the ongoing process of switching to a virtually all electronic health record at Sinnissippi Centers. That process has not been short nor has it been easy. Enormous amounts of time, effort, and resources have been expended in bringing our Electronic Health Recored (EHR) online. EHR's are designed to provide accurate up to date and complete information about clients at the point of care. They can enable quick access to records for more coordinated and efficient and effective care. They also offer advantages in diagnosis, prescribing medications, and ideally reduce costs due to reduced paperwork and improve safety.

Strategic Planning and the Future

Sinnissippi Centers is moving forward with a new strategic plan that includes continuing our work moving toward Integrated Health Homes (IHH), Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT), and much needed technology upgrades. We continue to look for ways to reduce expenses and implement more environmentally friendly ways of doing our work, like conducting meetings with virtual/electronic materials and reducing the use of paper. We are hoping to open a recovery home for women sometime in the future. Strategic planning has become more and more important in a challenging fiscal environment and an ever changing behavioral healthcare industry. The future looks challenging, but also bright.




Educational Attainment of Our Staff




