Sinnissippi Centers Board in Transition

Prindaville passes the torch to new board chair

There has been a transition in the leadership of the Sinnissippi Centers' Board of Directors. Larry Prindaville handed over the role of Board Chair to Sue Schroeder on October 15, 2025.

Prindaville said, "I was the first Chair of the Sinnissippi Board following the merger of SPF Development Corporation, the Sinnissippi Foundation, and Sinnissippi Centers. That was July 1, 2021, through October 15, 2025."

At one time, the operation of Sinnissippi Centers required the existence of multiple corporations that were later merged into one nonprofit corporation - Sinnissippi Centers, Inc. SPF Development Corporation primarily held and maintained Sinnissippi's offices and other buildings and the Sinnissippi Foundation was the fundraising arm of Sinnissippi. There were other corporations with their corresponding corporate boards that served other functions.

Prindaville said, "Prior to the merger, I had been the Chairperson of SPF Development Corporation starting in 2016, and a member of the Board of Directors of Alliance, Inc (2017-2019), and of the Sinnissippi Foundation subsequent to the dissolution of Alliance, Inc in June 2019."

Prindaville adds, "My initial affiliate board membership began in November 1999, when I was elected to the boards of directors of the corporations that own and oversee Sinnissippi Centers' apartment sites." While no longer chair, Prindaville continues to serve on the Sinnissippi Board of Directors.

"It's been a privilege to serve for so many years on the boards of Sinnissippi - along with notably dedicated board and administrative staff - who promulgate the mission and values exemplified by the agency," Prindaville said.

Sue Schroeder took over as Chair of the Sinnissippi Centers Board of Directors October 15, 2025. She has a bachelor's degree from the University of Iowa. She is a devoted Hawkeye's fan and says, "My phone ringtone is even the Hawkeye fight song." Schroeder has a master's degree in social work from Aurora University. She has been working in the mental health field since 1981. Schroeder has worked at Stepping Stones in Rockford, Illinois for thirty years, the last ten years as Chief Executive Officer.

Arize and Shine! Agency Transitions to New Electronic Health Record

On October 1, 2025, Sinnissippi moved from the Credible Electronic Health Record (EHR) to Arize, an EHR developed by Cantata Health Solutions. The process of selecting Arize as Sinnissippi's next EHR began in January 2024. Since that time, a dedicated team of Sinnissippi staff has met regularly to plan for the conversion. Led by EHR Administrator Megan Boyd and Director of Corporate Compliance and Quality Assurance Cris Mugrage, the Sinnissippi Arize team worked closely with the Cantata Arize team to develop workflows, customize forms, develop reports, provide staff training, and perform all the functions necessary to move from Credible to Arize. The move is designed to provide more transparency for

December is National Impaired Driving Awareness Month

Each year around 10,000 – 15,000 people are killed in alcohol-impaired driving crashes, nearly 33% of all traffic-related deaths in the United States. Individuals age 21 to 24 have the highest percentage (29%) of alcohol-impaired drivers involved in fatal traffic crashes. In addition, marijuana users were about 25% more likely to be involved in a crash than drivers with no evidence of marijuana use. The best way to stay safe this holiday season is to plan to celebrate safely.

Medication Assisted Recovery

Medication Assisted Recovery (MAR), also sometimes called Medication Assisted Therapy, is used in conjunction with outpatient therapy or group therapy to assist the wellness of individuals struggling with substance use disorders (SUD's). Addiction is a chronic illness that individuals struggle with throughout their entire lifetime.

Long-term use of substances such as opioids or alcohol damages parts of the brain responsible for pleasure and motivation. MAR, in conjunction with substance use treatment, works to assist the individual in managing their cravings, urges, and triggers, all while allowing the brain to heal.

Opioid use disorder and alcohol use disorder are chronic diseases like heart disease or diabetes. A chronic disease is a medical condition that requires treatment. By managing these disorders, individuals can regain a healthy, productive life.

MAR stabilizes the brain – it helps break the cycle of cravings and withdrawal, which can last for years after the last drug use. MAR allows individuals to fully benefit from counseling and peer support.

SUD is a lifelong illness, and many individuals will relapse before achieving lasting recovery. Medications support recovery by lowering the risk of relapse and, if relapse occurs, helping reduce the chance of overdose.

Every individual is different, but research shows that the longer patients are on MAR, the better their rates of long-term success. Some individuals may utilize MAR for the rest of their lives. There is no right or wrong length of time - it all depends on the individual's needs.

Research shows that individuals should receive medication for as long as it provides a benefit. This is known as maintenance treatment. Maintenance treatment allows individuals to focus on other parts of their lives. Ongoing maintenance for a substance use disorder is no different than taking medicine to manage high blood pressure, high cholesterol, or diabetes. If

Sinnissippi clients - as the Arize system provides a robust consumer access portal - while continuing to allow Sinnissippi clinicians to provide high quality, effective services that are in compliance with healthcare regulations.

Change is hard, even if the eventual outcome is positive. Nearly every staff member in the agency was impacted by the change to Arize. When asked how she thinks the conversion is going, Cris Mugrage said, "Even though there have been many challenges to overcome, I have never once regretted our decision to make this change. The outcome for our clients and staff is going to be so much better."

Holiday Food Basket Project

Sinnissippi Centers is conducting its annual Holiday Food Basket Project during December 2025.

Each basket contains several nonperishable food items, such as canned fruits and vegetables, macaroni and cheese, mashed potatoes, a meat item, and a dessert item. There are four sizes of food baskets, each scaled to match family size.

Clinicians register eligible clients for the food baskets. In 2024, Sinnissippi distributed 220 food baskets. A fun fact: The total weight of all that food was roughly 3,500 pounds. Those 220 baskets fed over 750 individuals. Each basket costs an average of \$30.

Sinnissippi Centers Human Services Scholarship Program
